### Canadian Youth Volunteer at Sand Dunes

On July 23, 12 youth and three adult leaders from all across Canada arrived in Ottawa to work with local conservation group,



Biodiversity Conservancy, to save and protect the rare inland Pinhey Sand Dune ecosystem located within the National Capital Greenbelt. As part of their 2012 focus on leadership and sustainability, the Children's International Summer Village (CISV) youth joined in the effort to create awareness of this conservation project, identifying and cataloguing endangered insects, and clearing encroaching vegetation to restore this unique habitat. Councillor Egli was on site to welcome the

youth and help search for ant lions and other insects. "Over the past year we restored a large, core dune with the help of the local community and many dedicated volunteers," said Stephen Aitken, project coordinator of Biodiversity Conservancy. "This rare ecosystem harbours many unique organisms and this year, with the collaboration of the NCC and a new generation of enthusiastic volunteers, we hope to recapture more of the original sandy dune habitat." ### Fall Transit Service Improvements

Ottawa Transit Services has indicated service changes that will come into effect Sunday, September 2 and Tuesday, September 4, 2012. The changes fall into several categories, some include:

- Deployment of the new Double-Decker Bus Fleet – the new buses are expected to begin arriving in late August. Once sufficient operators have been trained, the double-deckers will begin to operate on many busy routes.
- Service capacity improvements – the frequency of service will be increased to reduce crowding on busy routes and to meet service capacity standards on Route 111 and higher capacity buses will be assigned to increase capacity at key times on both route 111 and 118.

### Garbage Collection Changes

This fall this City will start its weekly year-round green bin collection program. The green bin accepts all soiled paper waste (pizza boxes, paper towels) and food waste (including rice, pasta, dairy products, meat, food scraps etc). If used properly the green bin will reduce your garbage drastically.

Garbage will be collection biweekly. Households can put out up to six approved containers of garbage every two weeks (an increase from the current three).

### MPAC Latest Market Snapshot Released

The Ontario Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) has published its Market Snapshot. This is their report on Ontario residential property sale price trends since the last assessment in 2008. The report is intended to prepare property owners in Ontario for the new assessments that will be mailed out this fall.

MPAC assessments are conducted every four years. The last assessment was conducted as of January 1, 2008 for the 2009-2012 taxation years. This next assessment was done as of January 1, 2012 for the 2013-2016 taxation years. Assessment increases are phased in over four years and the full effect of any change will not be implemented until 2016. Any property owners who have an assessment decrease will see their taxes reduced immediately in 2013 with no phase-in period.

As the report shows, the average residential property in Ottawa has seen a 24 per cent increase in assessed value over the four years since the last assessment in January 1, 2008. This does not mean that property owners in Ottawa will experience a 24 per cent increase in municipal property tax. The City's tax rates are set each year based on the budgetary increases approved by Council. The effect of the change in the assessed value is different for each property.

Property owners who have an increase in assessment over the four years of 24 per cent will see an increase in their municipal taxes equal to any budgetary increase that may be approved by City Council. Property owners who have an increase in assessment over the four years greater than 24 per cent will see an increase in their municipal taxes greater than any budgetary increase that may be approved by City Council. Finally, property owners who have an increase in assessment over the four years of less than 24 per cent will see their municipal taxes change by less than any budgetary increase that may be approved by City Council and some may even see their taxes decrease over their 2012 taxes.
